In honor of my family being on the cover of this month's *Blessings* I felt it would be appropriate to share something that God has been putting on my heart for a few weeks now. In recent weeks I "came clean" to the folks at prayer meeting and informed them that when I think about the many strengths of our church; those areas that are dynamic and vigorous;

Wednesday night prayer meeting never crosses my mind. As a matter of fact there have been moments when I was bored out of my mind at the thought of even attending prayer meeting. After sharing my heart I found that I was not alone. Many felt the same way I did. We felt like we were simply punching in on our time sheets and "doing what we were supposed to do" when really our hearts and minds where on different things.

In an attempt to correct or change this I have started teaching from passages of scripture where Jesus spoke about prayer or actually prayed. The last Wednesday of August proved to be life changing, at least for your pastor. We learned that Jesus begins The Lord's Prayer with "Our Father." The word "Our" signifying that prayer time as believers is a collective issue (a "we are in this together" type of statement) and the word "Father" showing that the relationship is not a formal one but one between a Dad and His kids. Prayer time together is a family affair. Prayer meeting is a glorious time we have as kids to sit in the lap of Dad and exclaim his goodness; to sing His praises; and to ask Him to meet our needs.

My intimacy with this really started as Cooper has gotten older and desires to spend time with me. I can't tell you how wonderful it is when she sits in my chair with me and as we are watching television I feel those little eyes staring at me. When I look at her she will often times say, "I love you" or she will lay her head on me and say "my father" (a phrase she picked up from a Disney movie). It is just a dad and his daughter hanging out and enjoying each other's company and I wouldn't miss it for the world. As a matter of fact I spend much of my day thinking about and looking forward to getting home and having those moments. They are precious.

What does this have to do with our Church? The answer is everything. Maybe the reason some don't feel like coming is because we have made church a formal occasion for religious piety instead of a family affair. Maybe the reason prayer time is stale is because we gather and make a list about all the needs but we never take the time to talk with God. Maybe the reason it's a struggle to fill positions and find teachers for the children is those are viewed as work as opposed to a chance to serve the family. And maybe just maybe the reason church is a drain and a bore is because we punch in for work instead of getting together for a family reunion.





## Attention all youth


All youth (grades 6-12) are invited to a party at Michelle and Thad Kitchens' home Saturday, September 5 at 6pm.

## **Ready and willing**




